

**TESTIMONY**  
**2016 Special Session**

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Mr. Chairman and members of the senate education committee:

My name is Tara Bitz and I am the Early Childhood Administrator for the Department of Public Instruction. I am here to provide a report on SB 2151.

The Early Childhood Education Grant program was established by the 2015 64th Legislative Assembly to assist North Dakota's communities with public, private, nonprofit or partnership entities offering early care and education a chance to enhance their programs through community collaboration.

The North Dakota Department of Public Instruction (NDDPI) is working collaboratively with the North Dakota Department of Commerce (Commerce) regarding the implementation of SB 2151. Department collaboration developed program guidance, a grant application, and project resources and were made available online through both Commerce and NDDPI.

The state level collaborative team has met regularly during the planning year to ensure the project requirements were developed and disseminated to the field with a process in place to take field inquiries and submission of grant applications.

During the 2015-2016 planning year, the superintendents of each school district were required to call and hold a coalition meeting to decide if they were applying or not and identify their coalition by November 30, 2015. The NDDPI and Commerce team worked collaboratively to disseminate the information to all early care and education entities through electronic notices, newsletters, attending a variety of education and early childhood association meetings, and statewide conference sessions. Out of the 179 school districts in North Dakota, 172 superintendents called and held their coalition meeting based on the data collected in the department's state automated reporting system (STARS).

Eligible applicants were requested to estimate the number of 4 year olds qualifying to receive free or reduced meals as well as all other 4 year olds that will be served by the program. This cumulative number will provide a comprehensive view of the program. This information establishes the funding basis for the award.

Grants were awarded and will be disbursed on a quarterly reimbursement basis. To ensure accountability, payments will be supported by grantees providing quarterly reports demonstrating the aggregate number of 4 year olds served during the quarter as provided through the NDDPI's STARS. Commerce will establish quarterly funding disbursement reviews.

The NDDPI has built data collection measures into the STARS where grantees will be required to report early childhood student enrollment data. School districts

accessing the grant will provide their data into PowerSchool and programs not affiliated with a public school will complete their data collection requirements directly through STARS. Those data fields will feed into STARS enrollment, allowing NDDPI to share monthly aggregate program data with Commerce in order to make the quarterly payments.

At the close of the application process on April 1, 2016, it is encouraging to report the Department of Commerce received 49 applications ranging from school districts, child care centers, and Head Start programs; requesting a total of \$879,000. Commerce awarded all 49 applicants of which 48 accepted the award; therefore allocating \$839,000 for awards. At the time of issuing the grant awards, the anticipated enrollment of granted programs for the 2016-2017 school is 1,073 pre-kindergarten children; 335 free lunch; 169 reduced lunch; 569 all other. The NDDPI will be collecting enrollment data from all 92 department approved pre-kindergarten programs during the 2016-2017 school year.
